

SEPT. 19TH LOGIC MODEL SUB-COMMITTEE MEETING 1 RECAP



Key Decisions Made

- ☑ It was agreed upon that changing people's perspective on SUD's is integral to both ensuring that stigma is reduced and those who seek care are treated with dignity
- ☑ Quicker and more relevant data gathering is important to this effort
- ☑ A clear path to care with a low barrier to entry is lacking in our region and absolutely essential going forward



Meeting Synthesis

- The sub-committee came together to illustrate the entire spectrum of the opioid epidemic to support the Regional Council to determine how litigation settlement funds will be prioritized in 2023
- The group reviewed public health approaches including frameworks for reducing health inequities and the social-ecological framework of the opioid crisis among others
- First steps were taken to populate a logic model which would illuminate how all opioid abatement strategies would lead to outputs, outcomes, and eventually ultimate impact in the community
- The question of "What will the system look like in 20-25 years time" was considered by content experts and providers to inform the "impact in Adams County" column of the logic model



Next Steps

- Finalize logic model (to include all relevant inputs, ensure logical and evidence-based connection between activities, strategies, and expected outcomes)
- Discuss the level of detail required for different audiences
